NC Pre-K










The NC Pre-K program ended the 2022-2023 school enrolled at 99.2%, with only 4 vacancies available within the entire program!

For the 2023-2024 school year, we have already received 474 NC Pre-K applications! And they continue to roll in daily! If you are interested, please apply here: NC PRE-K

In preparation for the 2023-2024 school year, over 400 DIAL4 screenings have been conducted at various DIAL4 screening events throughout Alamance County. Those events wrapped up on Wednesday, May 31, 2023.

We will begin t work on placing eligible children in NC Pre-K classrooms in July 2023, notifying parents and families of our placement decisions at that time as well. Check your email for updates.





Provide a backpack or bag to carry papers and personal belongings to and from school. Your child will need a light blanket and crib-sized sheet for rest time. If possible, provide a change of seasonally appropriate clothes in case your child needs to change clothes during the day.

Your homework is reading twenty to thirty minutes each night with your child. It is one of the best ways to help your child build vocabulary and strengthen language skills. Reading nightly is a great habit that will serve your child well in later years and is a good opportunity to have one on one time with your child. If you have older children, encourage them to read with the younger children. Visit your local library for a library card and ask the children's librarian for age-appropriate books that match your child's interests.

Reductions in parental depression and increases in parental self-confidence. Increases in positive family communication and problem-solving.

Reductions in conduct problems in children's interactions with parents and increases in children's positive affect and compliance to parental commands.

All participants who complete 11 of 14 classes will receive a \$50 incentive.





Positive Parenting Connection

Safety Hazards and Prevention Information for Parents and Caregivers

WATER = BE ALERT! <

DEHYDRATION INFORMATION

- Do not ignore crying. Crankiness is often an early sign of dehydration or heat discomfort.
- Respond attentively to your child's request for a drink of water.
- Be mindful of prolonged sun exposure and heat.

CAR = HOT ZONE

18 SECONDS

Drowning can happen in

67% of all drownings

10 accidental drownings a day is the average in the USA.

Children ages 1 to 4 have the highest drowning rates.

Orowning most often occurs quickly and quietly, children do NOT scream, yell or splash for help, source

First Check - Then Click

- Buckles and car seat straps pose a hidden burn
 hazard!
- Check the temperature before placing child in seat

 A cold wash cloth or ice pack can help cool buckles
- Dress child in clothes that offer a barrier to the buckles (cover shoulders, chest and thighs)

Did you Know?

The inside of a car on a summer day can reach 109° F/ 42° C in under 10 minutes.

STOP!

Do NOT leave children in the car.

Don't forget your Sleeping child!!
Place your purse/phone or other important items
on the back seat with your child.

Keep keys out of reach and the car securely locked.
